What We Do



We begin the week with a slab of concrete that has been pre-laid as a foundation. We then construct frames to form the walls, on which we mount the T1-11 plywood siding (which we also paint). From there we frame out the roof, and then mount plywood with a layer of

tar paper. We cut out four holes in the walls and then install three windows & door. Inside we sheetrock, spackle and paint the walls. Finally we install a basic electrical system of a few plugs and lights. If there is time and materials we also build beds and shelving.



The Difference It Makes



Many of the houses that you see in the hills of Baja are multi family.

Often these houses are small and made from materials that we would normally discard.

Yet while families are financially poor, they are rich in spirit & warmth and it is a

privilege to build and give them a house.

It is a house that affords effective shelter for a family, and in many cases leads to a dramatic reduction in childhood illnesses.

Our goal is to leave the family with a house that they can make into a home.
